I appreciate my time with him, and I appreciate you all very much. Clarence had some wonderful friends and the family draws a lot of comfort in his last years, and years before of course. You all treated him so well. He said they treat me like a king and I said well that's what you want, isn't it? And he said yes. But thank you again from the bottom of our hearts. We appreciate it and the family thanks you.

The first thing I remember about Clarence was his grip. I came to find out there was more to that than I realized. The first time Brian and I were here together was the first Wednesday in January. We were here for the meeting in the afternoon. That's when I met Clarence. But you know the grip of Clarence's hand really reflected the grip that Clarence's heart had on the things that were important. There is a verse in Hebrews that talks about this. It is in the second chapter of Hebrews. The writer to those people simply wrote like this... "Therefore, we ought to give the most earnest heed to the things which we have heard lest at anytime we should let them slip." Even in life there is this possibility that things will slip away from us. We learn that because there may be people that we knew 30 years ago that we haven't seen since, situations or families that we knew 30 years ago that we haven't been around since. If we have the chance to be around them the human tendency is think that this is going to be wonderful, but we find out that it somehow is not the same. That is because in life we grow, and we change. And very unfortunately it happens to people that some of the things, some of the very valuable things, that they once held in the tiny little hand of their heart when they were small... some of those things can slip away in the course of life.

I appreciated especially what Kent was saying. This idea, that I was inspired by Clarence, and I want to be like Clarence. That is a beautiful testimony and beautiful truth. One thing about that kind of expression is that it's not as commonly heard in young people today as it was 40 or 50 or 60 years ago. Part of the reason for that is that in the course of time since then life has become much more complicated. Young people have way, way, way more sources of input into their life now. Far more entertainment. What that means is that it is far more difficult for young people today to stop and think about what they appreciate and about what that might mean for their future.

So, one thing that is coming to me out of the course of our moments this morning, is for all of us that are a little bit younger... we would do really, really well to occasionally to stop and think about the people we appreciate in our life. Why we appreciate them? We would do really well to stop and think to ourselves... you know, I would like to be like that. Because if we don't stop and think about that what will happen to us is it will slide away from us and it will lose its grip on us and it will be gone. So, the things we value in others we want to hang unto that. Because it is only by hanging unto it and taking steps in the right direction that we can have them in our lives. That's why you feel so inspired when you think of Clarence.

I thought about this grip that he had on his faith. I don't know when that got started.. I appreciate what somebody mentioned, that he enjoyed Isaiah, and I can believe that. In the few short conversations that we had with him, usually on Wednesday if we were here for the meeting, Clarence would talk about Jesus who is our Savior and what that meant to him. He would talk about Him and talk about what Jesus was like in a very deep way. I mean in as deep a way as a man 93 or 94 could. Also, it wasn't in a way that was like... I'm so important that I appreciate what Jesus did for me. That wasn't the way that Clarence thought. He was so impressed with what Jesus was and the way the scriptures talked about Him before his life and after his life. That is a very good grip for a person to have on his faith. I appreciate that Clarence had that, and it never slipped away from him.

So many things in life can slip away. Usually when we think about grip and things slipping away, we think about the sand on a beach or trying to grab a handful of water out of the pond it just sort of goes away because of cracks. But there is a way that we can hang unto the things that are important. We want to do that. We want to be diligent about that. Because that is the only way it really happens. So, I have appreciated thinking about that in regard to Clarence.

There is another part of Clarence's life. We have been hearing about this. I like the word loyalty. We have heard of love and support and encouragement. We heard about that from a lot of different places. Especially what Patty was sharing with us about her son and daughter-in-law and their situation. I've seen a lot of people in life about whom other people would say. if you got on their list of friends, you would never get off it. I've heard a lot of people say that about a lot of people. Some of those people that I have heard that expression be made about. it wasn't very easy to get on their list of friends. If you got there, that was a very good thing. There are people like that and there are good reasons for people to be that way. But Clarence was not a difficult person to get on his list of friends. I really appreciate that. In don't know if it is because we are the workers, but I felt from the very first moment that we met Clarence, that he was behind us and supporting us and next to us and would do anything he could to help us. He said

anything that he could have said to help us. It didn't take very long to get there. That's a sign of a person who is very content with what he has so that he doesn't feel threatened by the things that are around him. He has a lot to give instead of being someone that has to take. That's a wonderful mark. That's the mark of Jesus himself.

That's how it was. We arrived and Clarence was like that, and I was trying to think of how I can explain this from our standpoint as the people who are trying to be the servants of God. How would I explain this? You know there are several people in the Bible that came to my mind. They all are associated with this idea that in the course of the Bible which is really the history of God's people. That's one way to think about the Bible. It is the history of God's people. Like every national history, at certain times in that story there were people that were very, very important. Not everybody was very, very important. But certain times in God's gospel there were certain people that were very important. Then there were a lot of people who were important to God but as far as the story goes, they were fairly common and regular, and you wouldn't feel there was any grand significance to them in the grand scheme of things. So, among these very, very important people, for example, there were people like David, Moses, Jeremiah, Paul. Most important, of course, was Jesus himself. But there were certain people behind the scenes who all those people knew, that person has my back. Those people are not the famous people, they are not the ones that everybody knows about but when you read those stories you realize those were critical people. In our fellowship and in the way that it works, it seems that people want to look to people like Brian and myself. That doesn't mean that we are more important than anyone else. But it does leave us with a little more responsibility. The thing is, we need people that have our back too. That's the way I thought about Clarence.

I was going to tell you about some of these people who were in the Bible like that. We know that when David was very young and had just barely fought that battle with Goliath, had slain the giant. He was trying to be as good of a person and helpful to God's people as he could and to the nation of God. Then there was this problem because King Saul was very envious and very fearful of David, because it was obvious that God was with David. So, David had a very uncomfortable position. David's best friend in that situation was a man named Jonathan. Jonathan came to David many times at his own risk to let David know what was happening and to let David know, look, I'm behind you. Even to such an extent that it happened in one place that there were certain pieces of armor that Jonathan took off and gave to David. Jonathan was Saul's son and so by birth rite he would be the next King. But it was like Jonathan saying to David I know that you are really the one and that you should have all of this because you are going to be the King, and I'm behind you. It says that the soul of Jonathan and the soul of David were knit together. That was a very, very, close friendship and very, very close kind of support. David needed that.

Moses was the leader of God's people probably in the physical sense, the national sense the greatest leader there ever was among the people of God. Today we have leaders, but they are spiritual. But Moses was a natural leader. There was one day when there was a battle going on and Moses was trying to pray for the help of the battle. There was a man named Hur that simply stood by Moses and helped him to pray. It was a famous battle. And it WAS actually a miraculous battle. During the course of the battle, Hur (which is a strange name) simply helped Moses to pray. And Moses needed that help. I appreciate people who are very unknown in many ways

but have this ability to encourage other people to pray and have the ability to encourage me to pray. We need that and Moses needed that. It was a great thing that a man like Hur was standing next to him to support him and be close to him.

Jeremiah was the prophet of the people of God. He was the prophet of God to the people. He didn't necessarily have good things to tell them. Jeremiah had to tell them it is going to get bad and then it is going to get good. What God is telling us is that in the time that it is going to get bad just hang on to our faith and keep looking to Him and keep believing. Even though we are going to have to go a long, long ways away God isn't going to forget us. He is going to be with us and He is going to come with us and then it will be good. That is what Jeremiah had to tell them. People don't like to hear that. People don't like to hear that it is going to be bad and then it will be good. People like to hear that it is going to be good right away. So, the people threw Jeremiah in the dungeon which was like a pit. But a couple of those were Jeremiah's friends and they figured a way to pull Jeremiah out of the pit so that he would not die. That was a great risk and Jeremiah needed that. There were people behind the scenes that were standing behind Jeremiah.

In the days of Paul's ministry, he needed people like Aquilla and Priscilla whom he could discuss questions with. They had great vision themselves and therefore could be a big encouragement to the rest of the fellowship. Paul needed people like that. But he also needed people like a man needed Onesimus who came to prison and sought him out. Just so that he could have someone to encourage him.

You see how this was. All the way through the people of God, the ones that had the responsibility did well because there were people next to them and behind them that they knew were their support. This is what Clarence was to us even in the small way that a man who was living in an assisted living facility could be... which on the surface doesn't look like very much, but it is.

In one sense Jesus had that because when He sat down for the very last time with his disciples before He was put to death one of the things that He told them was: You are they who have continued with me in my temptations and so you have a place in my Kingdom. We often think of Jesus as being the greatest of all. He was the greatest of all and we could think of Him as self-sufficient. But I suppose that in one way He was self-sufficient, but He was the Son of God. Even if there had been no one that ever believed, Jesus could have had a way to function in the world. However, those are wonderful words: You are they that have continued with Me in my temptations. That's like Jesus telling them... you guys had my back and I appreciate it. It's like telling them there was a lot that you didn't understand about what was going on, but I knew that you were behind me. And I appreciate it. That's what He was telling them.

That's the feeling that I have had of Clarence in the way that he was to Brian and me in the time that we were with him. He was behind us and next to us and under us and would do anything that he could for us. I appreciate that. I think that probably whatever condition in life that any of us would have had, whether it would be parallel to Clarence in age and experience or whether it would been a situation where he had more responsibility than we had. I think that everyone of us would have this feeling of Clarence, I know that man is with me and cares and wants me to do nothing but prosper and wants everything to go well with me. I think all of us would have

known that from Clarence. And that is so nice. That is the way that everyone that met Jesus was, they knew that He wanted them to prosper.

Solomon when he was writing his proverbs... there are three places where he wrote about brothers. One place he wrote... there is a friend that sticks closer than a brother. I think the greatest friend of course is Jesus. But there is the way that the people of God and the people of faith are not only friends to one another, but they are brothers. That is why I said in the beginning that the word that sticks in my mind is loyalty. That is the way I think of Clarence. Once you got on his list of friends you were going to be on his list of friends, and it wasn't very difficult to get on that list. We do appreciate that about him.

But we appreciate most of all what the work God did that in him. We would like that the same kind of working would be done in us. People always say good words at times like this. I think it would be a terrible tragedy if it were my day and people were talking about me because I loved this world and they only said good words because they knew they were supposed to say good words. That would be a terrible tragedy. We are not saying good words about Clarence because we know we are supposed to, but we are saying things about him because the Lord did good things for him. In the same way we want the Lord to do some things for us that nobody else can do.
